Garden Railroad Progress Update

Work on rebuilding the Phillip Pratt Memorial Garden Railway layout is ongoing, with about 120 logs installed so far. Initially, we received enough utility poles for Xcel to create over 90 six- and eight-foot logs, covering roughly half of the planned layout before needing more poles. On September 10, a new supply of logs arrived, which Ken Watson, Chris Childress,

Chris Mitchel, and I processed into 130 additional 6' logs, now ready for installation. Tracy Ball handled excavation, and Kenneth Berry provided the bandsaw for log preparation.

Log Installation

Significant progress has been made on the rebuilding of the Phillip Pratt Memorial Garden Railway layout, with approximately

120 logs installed so far. The inner wall of the retaining structure has been reinforced with landscape fabric, asphalt felt, and, in some areas, shingles to ensure greater stability and effective containment for the soil fill planned within the retaining walls.
